## Christmas in Spencer's Early Days

Celebrating Christmas and the holidays is a long tradition in western culture. How people did it though has changed through the years. This article is about Christmas in Spencer, OK from around 1900 to 1930.

The biggest difference between modern Christmas celebrations and those in the early 1900s is the ability to buy decorations and artificial trees. Although manufactured decorations were available in large cities, most were not sold in rural areas like Spencer. Or if they were, they were unaffordable to people who lived in farming communities.



Instead, Christmas decorations were all or partially handmade, like these ornaments from our history museum.

Stringing popcorn for decorations was common. It was inexpensive and a fun family activity. Mistletoe and pine cones were also used, with ribbons added for extra flair.

Mistletoe came to be a part of the holiday season because it's one of the only flowers to bloom in Winter. It's also hard to find when leaves are on the tree, but easy to

spot when the leaves have fallen. Pine cones most often drop during the cold months, making it simple to find a fresh cone to bring inside.

As far as getting a Christmas tree to decorate, if you didn't have a cedar or pine tree on your land then you were unlikely to find one for sale. The answer for many people was to get a tree branch and decorate that. We tried to find some old photos, but imagine a cut branch in a pail of water covered with ornaments, beads, ribbons, and of course, strings of popcorn. Pine branches were best, but any type would do.

Today we can buy artificial trees, ornaments, strings of LED lights and much more, with most shipped from factories located overseas. Maybe we should save a few dollars and bring it home by crafting decorations as a family again?




